
YVES TARALON X CODIMAT COLLECTION

Woven in workshops at the end of the world, this collection, halfway between art and decoration, is aimed at a demanding clientele.

It is in the heart of the Val de Loir, in his family home, that Yves Taralon enjoyed staging his creations and his Codimat Collection favorites, in a story that tells the osmosis between a carpet and an house.



CHEMIN

Natural and charming, this rug in warm colors of spices and clay emphasizes the geometry of a room. Beautiful travel memories, Bedouin and the Moroccan Atlas, it will find its place in any interior to spice up them with subtlety.

Like an invitation to enter this house bathed in light and softness, CHEMIN leads the visitor's footsteps.

IKAT

The art of lkat is as much the expression of a culture as it is the graphic expression of eternal know-how that adapts to contemporary creations in all areas of decoration.

Inspired by the gardens and palaces of the Middle East, by the Grand Mosque of Damascus, IKAT is a masterful, theatrical carpet which becomes the centerpiece of the living room.



YVES TARALON

Interior architect, decorator, former artistic director of Tableware Hermès, Puiforcat and Saint Louis, designer, creator During his long and prestigious career, Yves Taralon has exercised all talents. Although he alone embodies a French art de vivre of which he is a staunch defender, Yves has passionately blended styles, crafts, cultures and skills, picked up around the world. Even today, his passion remains boundless for these ancestral manufacturing techniques that have never been equaled, thanks to their accuracy, their refinement, their apparent simplicity. They are a reflection of the intelligence of the hands of the world.

CYPRÈS

The cyprès, omnipresent tree in Mediterranean and Eastern cultures, always green and bearing fruit, symbolizes eternal life. Poetic and symbolic evocation of a garden, this flexible, light, nomadic rug unfolds, drapes itself like a plaid or a cape. Hand-embroidered rug in India, in the Agra region, where the tradition of embroidery has been passed down from generation to generation.

Near the fireplace where the reserve of logs is stored, CYPRÈS takes all its strength and fits perfectly into this warm, cozy and refined decor





TRIBUTE TO BARRAGAN

(1902 - 1988)

A tribute to Luis Barragan, a Mexican architect whose work has given rise to schooling, and for whom color, complementing architecture, enlarges or reduces a space. Here, the colors are mineral, ocher, pink, ash, enhanced with hints of gold. An architectural elegance in the tradition of Mallet-Stevens and Le Corbusier.

The modernity of BARRAGAN underlines the design of the floor lamps and fireside chairs placed like a confidant in front of the Renaissance fireplace.

ÉBÈNE

Yves Taralon's favorite for ÉBÈNE. Simple in appearance, this rug is a clever weave of brown raffia.

It finds here all its expression by harmonizing with the colors of terracotta, orange and golden yellow of the textiles of the bench and the eclecticism of this decoration where Indian headdresses, leather armchairs, Chinese vases mingle and painting by MC de Maupeou.





BIVOUAC

The vibrant expression of silk in natural, vegetal and mineral colors for this Moroccan-inspired rug.
